REPORT:

The committee on Colored Population to whom was referred the application of Hugh Cox, of Charles county to bring into this State certain negro slaves now in the State of Louisiana, report that the said Cox is now authorised by the existing laws of the State, to remove these negroes into the State by complying with the several provisions of the act of 1839, ch. 15, and the late action of the House of Delegates upon the bill to remove the restriction upon the introduction of slaves into this State, preclude the probability at present, that the General Assembly will depart from the policy in any particular case.

Mr. Carey, from the committee on Ways and Means, made an unfavorable report upon the petition of Edward Smithson and one hundred and forty-two other citizens of Harford county, praying a repeal of the fifth section of the act of 1841, chapter 194;

Which was twice read and concurred in.

Mr. Yellott, from the committee on Ways and Means, to which
