Resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Stephenson called for the yeas and nays, which call was not sustained by the House.

On motion of Mr. Wootten,

The House then took a recess until 7 o'clock P. M.

The House met.

Mr. Potter, chairman of the committee on Education, made a favorable report upon the report of the Shrewsbury Academy;

Which was twice read and concurred in.

Mr. Curley reported a bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act to incorporate Washington Beneficial Society of Baltimore, passed at December session 1833, chapter 128;

Which was read the first and by a special order the second

time:

On motion of Mr. Calvert,

Said bill was amended by adding at the end thereof as an additional section the following:

"And be it enacted, That the Legislature hereby expressly reseves the right to repeal modify or alter this act at any time."

The said bill was then passed as amended and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Phelps (being in the chair.)

Mr. Watson (the Speaker,) moved that the House take up the bill to extend the charter of the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road

Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion of Mr. Watson, (Speaker,)

Said bill was referred to the Baltimore City Delegation.

Mr. Johnson submitted the following preamble and resolutions: Whereas, it is understood that an act providing for the transfer of the stock held by the United States in the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company, to the State of Maryland, has passed the United States Senate, and that the same is now pending in the House of Representatives. Therefore,

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland. That the Representatives of this State in the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States, be requested to give their prompt and earnest attention to the subject, and to expedite the passage of said act through the said House, by every means in their power.
