time to complete his collections.

Mr. Stansbury, of Baltimore county, from the minority of the committee appointed to report a bill, entitled, an act to divide the State into six Congressional districts, made a report as a substitute for the bill reported by the majority, being a bill entitled, an act to divide the State into six Congressional districts;

Which was read, and

On motion of Mr. Stansbury of Baltimore county,

Ordered to be printed.

Mr. Weber from the committee on Public Printing, submitted the following
