Mr. McKaig presented the petitions of Joseph Dilley, S. Alexander Lackey, Thomas M. Porter, and two hundred and sixty three other citizens of Allegany county, praying for a repeal of the provisions of the act of 1842, ch. 81, relative to the reduction of tolls on coal hauling on the National road, the reduction of the superintendent's salary, the prohibition of the employment of his teams on the road, and as to his competency and faithful discharge of the duties of his trust;

Mr. Ecker presented the petition of one hundred and three citizens of Carroll county, recommending the sale of the public works, a reduction of the direct tax, a rigid system of retrenchment, biennial sessions of the legislature, abolishing the High Court of Chancery, and a reduction of the salaries of all officers, &c.
