Which was read the first time, and

On motion of Mr. Hollyday, of Kent,
Referred to the committee on Colored Population.

Mr. Williams, of Baltimore city, submitted the following order :

Ordered, That the clerk of this House send daily, a copy of its journal, to the Mayor of the city of Baltimore ;

Which was read.

Mr. Potter moved to amend said order by adding at the end thereof the following, "and that the president or head of every corporation and literary institution in the State be also supplied with a copy of the journal of this House."

The Speaker announced that the hour had arrived for taking up the order of the day.

The House then resumed the consideration of the reports of the majority and minority of the committee on Elections and Privileges, upon the memorials of Edward Buckey and John H. Worthington, claiming seats as delegates from Frederick county.

The question before the House being upon the substitute offered by Mr. Hollyday, of Cecil, on the 20th instant, for the reports of the majority and minority of said committees.

After debate thereon,

Mr. Johnson, of Anne Arundel, moved the previous question, and being demanded by a majority of the members present, the said previous question was put, that is, "shall the main question be now put ?" and

It was resolved in the affirmative.

Mr. Raymond moved a call of the House,

Mr. Biser, rose to a point of order, that it was not competent to move a call of the House after the previous question had been ordered ;

Mr. Kilgour (being in the chair) decided that the motion for a call of the House was in order.

The House was then called and the doorkeeper sent for the absent members ;

Who after a short time, returned and reported, that he had notified the absent members that their attendance in the House was required.

The question was then put,

"Will the House accept the substitute as offered by Mr. Hollyday, of Cecil, for the reports of the majority and minority of the committee on Elections and Privileges ?" and

It was determined in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Shriver,

The yeas and nays were ordered and appeared as follows :
