Also, made a favorable report upon the bill from the Senate, entitled, an act supplementary to an act entitled, an act to incorporate the Pipe Creek Benevolent Society, passed at December session 1843, chapter 192;

Mr. Ford, of St. Mary's, presented the petition of J. W. Tracey, Jos. Worthington, and sundry other citizens, of Baltimore city, praying a change in the law regarding pilots;

Which was read and referred to the select committee appointed

on that subject.

Mr. Hollyday, of Cecil, presented two memorials, one signed by twenty-six citizens, and the other by thirty-six citizens of Cecil county, praying for the passage of an act prohibiting licenses to
