

discharging the duties of Armorer at Frederick, the said monies to be applied and used for the repairs and improvement of the Barracks, with the advice and direction of Thomas Contee Worthington, James M. Coale and Edward Schley, or a majority of them, who are hereby appointed commissioners for that purpose.

Resolved, That the said V. C. Saunders and John W. Wildman, shall on or before the first day of January in each year report to the Governor the number of pupils in said school, and the manner in which the foregoing sums of money may have been expended.

Resolved, That the privileges in these resolutions granted, may at any time hereafter be revoked, or annulled by a resolution of the General Assembly of Maryland, or should said military school be abandoned by the aforesaid V. C. Saunders and J. W. Wildman, the Governor of Maryland shall appoint an Armorer for said Barracks as heretofore.

Resolved, That nothing in these resolutions contained, shall be construed to exclude the volunteer companies of Frederick city or county, from the free use of the lot on which the said Barracks are situated, for drills, parades, musters or encampments, and the said companies, or any of them, shall from time to time, and at all times hereafter, have the right and privilege to use and occupy said lot and grounds for said purposes, whenever and as often as they see fit.

Which were read the first, and by a special order the second time, "assented to," and sent to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. Maffitt,

Leave was granted Messrs. Maffitt, Ware, Ford, of St. Mary's Lynch, Stansbury, of Baltimore city, Ebaugh and Biser, to bring in a bill so to alter and amend the Constitution and Form of Government of this State, so as to provide for the election of county clerks and registers of wills, of the several counties of this State, the city of Baltimore and Howard District by the people.

On motion of Mr. Ford of Queen Anne's,

The House took up for consideration the bill reported by him, entitled, an act to extend the time of Thomas W. DeCoursey, former collector of Queen Anne's county, to complete his collections;

The said bill was then read the second time, passed, and sent to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. Raymond,

The House took up for consideration the bill from the Senate, entitled, an act supplementary to an act entitled, an act to incorporate the Pipe Creek Benevolent Society, passed December session 1843, chapter 192;

The said bill was then read the second time, passed, and returned to the Senate.

On motion of Mr. Jump,

The House took up for consideration the bill entitled, a supplement to an act entitled, an act to establish primary schools in the
