Ordered, That it be entered on the Journal, that John Jump, Esq. of E., a delegate returned from Caroline county, is detained at home by indisposition.

On motion of Mr. Stansbury of Baltimore City,

Ordered, That it be entered on the Journal, that Mr. Springer of Baltimore City, is confined from the House by sickness.

On motion of Mr. Patterson,

Ordered, That when the House adjourn, it stand adjourned to meet at 11 o'clock, until further ordered by this House.

On motion of Mr. Motter,

Leave was granted the Washington county delegation, to bring in a bill entitled, an act to extend the time of William Dellinger, late collector of Washington county, to complete his collections.

On motion of Mr. Potter,

Leave was granted the committee on Grievances and Courts of Justice, to bring in a bill to abolish imprisonment for debt.

Mr. Johnson, of Frederick, presented the petition of Philip Roke, of Frederick county, a soldier of the Revolution, praying for a pension;
