

Also, a bill entitled, a further supplement to the act passed at December session 1826, ch. 189, entitled, an act to incorporate the Maryland Savings Institution;

Which were severally read and referred to the committee on Corporations.

Also, delivered a bill entitled, an act to authorise Nicholas S. Goldsborough and John F. Henry, trustees, to dispose of certain personal property therein mentioned, and to invest the same in real estate;

Which was read and referred to the committee on Grievances and Courts of Justice.

And a memorial of sundry citizens of Cecil county, praying for a repeal of the license laws;

Which was read and referred to the committee on Ways and Means.

Also, a bill entitled, an act to repeal in part the 3rd section of an act entitled, an act to repeal the third section of an act entitled, an act for the revaluation of the assessable property in Prince George's county, passed at December session 1824, ch. 38, and for other purposes;

Which was read and referred to the Prince George's county delegation.

Mr. Hughes reported a bill entitled, an act for the relief of Thomas B. Gwinn, Esq. trustee of Elizabeth Ellen Wildman;

Which was read the first and by a special order the second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

The hour having arrived for taking up the order of the day,

The House proceeded to consider the bill reported by Mr. Johnson, of Frederick, chairman of the select committee on the Chesapeake and Ohio canal company, entitled, an act to provide for the completion of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal to Cumberland, and for other purposes;

Mr. Archer moved to postpone said bill until Tuesday next;

Determined in the negative.

On motion of Mr. Biser,

Said bill was postponed until to-morrow.

Mr. Worthington, of Baltimore county, presented the petition of John W. Onion and others, of Baltimore county, praying for relief therein mentioned;

Mr. Worthington, of Baltimore county, moved that said petition be referred to the committee on Ways and Means.

Mr. Hollyday, of Cecil, called for the reading of the memorial, and while the clerk was reading the same,

Mr. Biser moved that the House adjourn.

Mr. Potter (being in the chair,) decided that under the 17th rule of the House any member might call for the reading of any paper before the House, and that the motion therefore to adjourn was not in order.
