

Which were severally read the first, and by special order the second time, passed and sent to the Senate.

Mr. Gallagher, chairman of the committee on Corporations, to which was referred the bill from the Senate, entitled, a further supplement to the act passed at December session 1826, ch. 189, entitled, an act to incorporate the Maryland Savings Institution, made a favorable report upon said bill;

Which was read the first and second time by a special order, passed and returned to the Senate.

Mr. Long, chairman of the committee on Grievances and Courts of Justice, to which was referred the bill from the Senate, entitled, an act relating to the removal of equity causes to the court of chancery from the first and sixth judicial districts, reported the same with the following amendment.

Amendment proposed.

In the second line amend the title by inserting after the word "first" the word "fourth;"

Which was read, and "assented to."

The said bill was then read the first and by a special order the second time, passed with the proposed amendment and returned to the Senate.

Mr. Sprigg, of Allegany, from the select committee, to which was referred the bill from the Senate, entitled, an act authorising the opening of a road for the use of James Smith of Allegany county, reported the same without amendment;

The said bill was then read the first and by a special order the second time, passed and returned to the Senate.

Mr. Johnson, of A. A., reported a bill entitled, an act for the relief of the Farmers' and Millers' Bank of Hagerstown;

Which was read the first time and ordered to lie on the table.

Mr. Morsell submitted the following resolutions:

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Baltimore and Ohio Rail Road company is not entitled to the use of the \$3,200,000, 5 per cent. sterling bonds issued by virtue of the act of December session 1838, ch. 386, and that the State is not bound to pay the same or the interest thereon.

Resolved, That the Governor be requested to give notice hereof by publication for four successive weeks in two newspapers published in each of the cities of Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York, Boston and London, and by giving official information of said resolution to the Messrs. Barings, the State Bankers at London;

Which were read the first time.

And after debate thereon,

The Speaker announced that the hour had arrived for taking up the order of the day.

The House then resumed the consideration of the order of the day, being the bill reported by Mr. Johnson, of Frederick, chairman of the committee on the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, entitled, an act to provide for the completion of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal to Cumberland, and for other purposes.
