Mr. Archer then moved to strike out the first section of said amendment, and insert in lieu thereof the first section of the original bill;

Determined in the affirmative.

Mr. Archer, then moved to strike out in the first section the word "twenty" and insert "fifty;"

Determined in the affirmative.

Mr. Ware moved the following as the second section:

And be it enacted, That if any person shall bribe or offer to bribe a legal voter, he shall be subject to the same fine and imprisonment as an illegal voter convicted as aforesaid;

Which was read and adopted.

Mr. Fitzpatrick moved as an additional section the following:

And be it enacted, That if any person shall threaten, or intimate in any way, a determination or purpose to discharge from his service, or employment, or to reduce the wages of any voter for the purpose of influencing, or in any respect, controlling the vote of such voter, the person so offending shall be subject and liable to indictment by the grand jury of the county in which he resides, and on conviction shall be fined by the county court not less than five hundred dollars, to be collected as fines are now collected; one half of said fine to be paid to the informer, and the other half to be paid to the levy court, or commissioners of such county, to be applied to the use of such county; and the person so offending shall also be imprisoned in the county jail of such county, for a period not less than six months;

Determined in the negative.
