Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That if it shall be found to be impracticable to effect the completion of the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal to Cumberland, in virtue of the provisions of the act passed at the present session, the State's agents are hereby directed to investigate thoroughly the subject of completing said canal, and to obtain all the information which can be procured on this subject, either by conferring with capitalists and contractors or in any other way, and the said agents are hereby directed to report the same to the Legislature at their next regular session, together with a statement showing the precise condition of the unfinished portion of said work, and they are hereby directed to submit to the Legislature a plan for the completion of said canal, in such manner and on such terms as they may deem most conducive to the interests of the State.
