The Speaker also laid before the House the following communication from the Treasurer of the State:

TREASURY,

Annapolis, January 10th, 1845.

To the Honorable

the House of Delegates :

In execution of your order of the 2nd inst. I have the honor to report, that no loan was negotiated by the Treasurer, under the authority vested in him by the act passed at December session 1831, ch. 281, which authorised him to borrow from time to time, a sum not exceeding in the whole \$200,000, to be applied by the Maryland State Colonization Society, to the removal of such slaves as might thereafter become free, and such people of color, as were then free, and might be willing to remove out of this State to the Colony of Liberia, or such other place out of the limits of this State as they may think best.

Under the authority of that act, it appears that the sum of \$129,000 arising from an annual levy on the several counties of the State, and the city of Baltimore, has been paid out of the Treasury to the society aforesaid, for the purposes which the loans was authorised to be applied.
