I immediately wrote to the President of these companies, requesting him to furnish as early as practicable, the data necessary to answer the order, and now have the honor to transmit to the House the explanation of the President, together with statements of the receipts and expenditures of the Susquehama canal company, and the Tide Water canal company, for the half year ending on the 31st December last. Statements for the first six months of the year have not been furnished.
