Leave was granted the committee on Grievances and Courts of Justice, to bring in a bill supplementary to the act of Assembly for the relief of sundry insolvent debtors passed at December session 1805, chapter 110.

Mr. Gallagher presented the memorial of sundry citizens of Baltimore, praying for the passage of a law providing for the inspection of white oak staves and heading;

Which was read and referred to the committee on Inspections.

Mr. Ware submitted the following order:

Ordered, That the committee on Ways and Means, be instructed to enquire into the expediency of bringing in a bill to authorise and compel the sale of all the State's property, of every description, except the State House and Penitentiary; and, that the proceeds be applied towards the liquidation of the State's liabilities;

Which was twice read, and

On the question being put,

"Will the House adopt said order?"
