So the House accepted the substitute.

The question was then put,

“Will the House adopt the order?”

Resolved in the affirmative.

The Speaker laid before the House, a report from Thomas H. Hicks, register of wills of Dorchester county, in obedience to the order of the House of Delegates, of the 8th instant;

Which was read and referred to the committee on Ways and Means.

The clerk of the Senate returned the bill entitled, an act to confirm and make valid the proceedings of Jacob Summers, of J. a justice of the peace, of Frederick county;

Also, the bill entitled, an act relating to the practice of the Court of Appeals, and of the second judicial district in certain cases;

Severally endorsed, “will pass,” and ordered to be engrossed.

Also, returned the bill entitled, a further supplement to the act entitled, an act for quieting possessions, enrolling conveyances and securing the estates of purchasers;

Endorsed, “will not pass.”

On motion of Mr. Lankford,

Ordered, That the committee on Retrenchment, be directed to inquire into the expediency of abolishing the office of Armorer at Annapolis, and devolving his duties upon the Adjutant General.

The Speaker announced that the hour had arrived for taking up the order of the day;

The House then proceeded to consider the order of the day, being the report submitted on the 18th inst. by Mr. Potter, chairman of the committee on Elections and Privileges, respecting the memorials of Edward Buckey and John H. Worthington, claiming seats as delegates from Frederick county.

Mr. Ware from the minority of the committee on Elections and Privileges, submitted the following, as a substitute for said report of the majority of the committee as offered by Mr. Potter:
