WEDNESDAY, January 22nd, 1845.

The House met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read.

The Speaker laid before the House a report from the President of St. John's College, relative to the condition of said institution:

The Speaker also laid before the House reports from the inspectors of tobacco at warehouses No. 1, 2 and 3, in the city of Baltimore, in obedience to the order of the House;

Which were read and referred to the committee on Inspec-

tions.

Also, reports from the registers of wills from Carroll, Talbot and Somerset counties, and the clerk of Carroll county court, in obedience to the order of the House of Delegates of the 8th instant;

Which were severally read and referred to the committee on

Ways and Means.

Mr. Thomas presented the memorial of Thomas Sewell, and other manufacturers and dealers in leather in the city of Baltimore, praying that the number of inspectors of leather may not be increased;

Which was read and referred to the committee on Inspec-

tions.

Mr. Potter presented the memorial of George W. Harrington and Thomas Burchenal, praying to be exonerated from any responsibility for the loss of certain arms, belonging to the State, which were destroyed by fire in the town of Greensborough in Caroline county;

Which was read and referred to the committee on the Militia.

Mr. Amos presented the petition of Nancy Lindsay, of Harford county, praying the passage of a law authorising and requiring the commissioners of Harford county, to levy a sum of money for the purposes therein mentioned;

Which was read and referred to the committee on Pensions to

Indigent Persons by County Assessment.

Mr. Fitzpatrick presented the petition of Lenox Martin, and others, in behalf of William Newman, praying the passage of a law for purposes therein mentioned;

Which was read and referred to the Allegany county delega-

tion.

Mr. Ghiselin presented the petition of the heirs of Clement Hollyday, a revolutionary officer, praying for relief;

Which was read and referred to the committee on Pensions

and Revolutionary Claims.

Mr. Archer presented affidavits in support of the claim of Nathan S. Bemis;

Which was read and referred to the committee on Claims.
