whereof doth hereby fully and absolutely Acquit Conser-

Bargained sold Aliened Enfeoffed & Confirmed and by these
- presents doth Give Grant Bargain sell Alien Enfeoff
and Confirm unto the said William Worthington his Heir
and Assigns for Ever all that Dividend or proportion of
Lands being numbered or called the first part of the second
Discovery lying and being in Annapolis County
Beginning at the End of the first Line of a Tract of Land
called altogether the Den up by Thomas Worthington and Henry
Ridgley it being likewise the Beginning of the said second
Discovery and running the first Line of the second Discovery
