Know all Men that on the twenty second Day of August in the Year of our Lord One Thousand Seven hundred
and fifty Personally appeared before me Henry White Esq. one of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace
for the afo. County Henry Parr Master or Commander of the Tasher Schooner of Maryland
and did solemnly declare and Protest upon Oath on the Holy Evangelist that on Sunday
the twenty ninth of July 1750 he set Sail in Company with the Godwin of Liverpool and
Humphrey of London all three from Barbadoes bound for the Capes of Virginia but on their
Voyage he met with Currents which set him much more to the Westward than he reckoned
himself and on the Seventeenth of this Present August at 11 Clock at Night found the afo.
Schooner to strike the Ground at Noon of the same Day he reckoned himself in the Longitude
72. 30 West from London and by Observation was in Lat: 36. 30 N. Tho' at that time he
reckoned himself at least forty Leagues from the Land but to his great Misfortune found it other
ways the said Deponent further declareth that soon after his being on Shore a violent
Storm ensued which caused a great Sea and forced the said Schooner well on upon the Shore
and at the same time Ruzged and filled and that on the Eighteenth and Nineteenth of the
same Month it blew quite a Storm of Wind E. and S. E. which with the great Sea that then
Ran hindered his getting to any Magistrate to make a Protest (being on a low Island of
Sand) till this 22nd Inst. but that he and his people all that time did their utmost to
save what they could of the Rigging and Cargo for the Benefit of the Owners or
