

Parcell of a tract or parcell of Land called Homewood's Lot patented upon a Resurvey of Eight Several Tracts containing in the whole One Thousand three hundred and Ninety two Acres Beginning for the said part or parcel at a Stone whereon are graven these Words "Begin. of Homewood's Lot" now fixed in the Ground in the Middle between two bounded White Oaks Standing about a perch from the head of a Creek called Scotcher's Creek the said two white Oaks being the beginning of the Resurvey of the whole Tract called Homewood's Lot as resurveyed the Tenth day of August Anno Domini Seventeen hundred and thirty four and patented to Thomas Homewood the Nineteenth day of February seventeen hundred and thirty five and running from the said Stone marked as aforesaid to the head of the Creek then down with the said Scotcher's Creek as the said Creek tunneth and with the Water Edge thereof to a Small Post bounded with Twelve Notches, the said post being heretofore planted at the very spot where the original Market Red Oak of Fullers Land now commonly called and known by the name of White Oak did stand on a Marshside near the head of above of Scotcher's Creek and on the south side of the head of said Cove and close to which post is now fixed a Stone whereon are graven these Words "Here Stand Wm. Fullers Red Oak"

(The aforesaid post being referred to in a Patent that was in the Year Seventeen hundred and Six granted for a tract of Land called Homewood's purchase and also in the patent that was granted in Seventeen hundred and thirty five for a tract called Homewood's Lot into which last mentioned tract the said called Homewood's purchase was reserved) then running from the said post or stone marked as aforesaid with Fuller's Land the following Courses Viz: North West Sixty five Perches and South West Seventy Six perches to a little marsh hence on the Marsh South Eighty two degrees West to the side of a Creek called Homewood's Creek Then up and with the said Creek as the Creek tunneth and with the Water Edge thereof to a Stone whereon are graven these Words "The Division Bound^r Between H.S. and I.H. 1763" now fixed on the East side of a Cove that lies to the South Eastward of the Creek
