In accordance with Article II, Section 17, of the Maryland Constitution, I have today vetoed Senate Bill 1151.

This bill eliminates the prohibition against selling alcoholic beverages to students at the Naval Academy, effective July 1, 1973.

House Bill 1250, which was enacted by the General Assembly and signed by me on April 26, 1973, accomplishes the same purposes as Senate Bill 1151, effective June 1, 1973.

Therefore, it is unnecessary for me to sign Senate Bill 1151.
