

## WICOMICO COUNTY

Shore Sheltered Workshop, Inc." and such other local laws pertaining to the subject matter of this Chapter as may have been heretofore enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, be and they are hereby repealed and re-enacted with amendments, said re-enacted Section to be known as Section 564-2 and to read as follows:

564-2. Appropriation - Lower Shore Sheltered Workshop, Inc.

The County Council of Wicomico County is hereby authorized and directed to levy a sum of [ (TEN) ] TWENTY Thousand Dollars [ (\$10,000.00) ] (\$20,000.00) and appropriate the same to the Lower Shore Sheltered Workshop, Inc., a non-profit corporation of the State of Maryland, to be used by said corporation in furtherance of its objectives.

Section 2. AND BE IT FURTHER ENACTED that this Act having been passed by the County Council of Wicomico County at its Legislative Session of June, 1973, shall take effect August 15, 1973, unless a proper petition for referendum thereof shall be validly filed prior to said date, in which event this Act shall not take effect until the expiration of thirty (30) days following approval of this Act by a majority of the qualified voters of the County voting in any such referendum.

## Bill 3

Introduced June 1, 1973

AN ACT to repeal and re-enact with amendments, Section 103 of Article 23 of the Code of Public Local Laws of Wicomico County (1965 Edition, being Article 23 of the Code of Public Local Laws of Maryland) title "Fire Companies" and such other local laws pertaining to the subject matter of this Chapter as may have been heretofore enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, authorizing an annual appropriation not to exceed Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000.00) for the several Volunteer Fire Companies in the said County and authorizing an annual appropriation of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the several ambulance companies in the said County and authorizing an annual appropriation to the City of Salisbury for the support of its fire companies.
