This Court orders that his Lordships Clerk & Auditor
for said Court Exhibit an Information against the
said Thomas Mason for the offence and after which came
the said Atty and Exhibited the Information as follows

Be it Remembered that Jacob Francis Gent Atty of
the Right Honorable the Lord Proprietary that now is who for
the same Lord Proprietary in this part prosecuteth doth
come here into the County Court of the same Lord Proprietary
held for that County and to wit at the Court house at the
Chester Town in the County and the Nineteenth day of Nov:
in the year of our Lord God Seventeen Hundred thirty four
before James Harriſ Esq and the rest of his Associates
the said Lord Proprietary his Justices of the same County
Court and for the same Lord Proprietary doth give
same Justices here to understand and be informed that
a certain Thomas Mason of Lower South Saffras Hundred
in the County and plantor on the third Tuesday of November
which was in the year of our Lord God Seventeen Hundred
thirty and two and always afterwards until the day of
the Exhibition of this Information being an inhabitant
and resident within the said Hundred and County and
within the Jurisdiction of this Court and a fit person to
execute the office of a Constable in the said Hundred & County
and was legally and in due form then and there elected
and appointed to be the Constable of the said Hundred
of which said election and appointment the said Thomas
afterward to wit the same day and yearly last mentioned
at the place and had notice and the Oath of a Constable of
the said Hundred and did take and the same Thomas was
and continued Constable of the said Hundred from the
said third Tuesday of November in the year of our Lord
God Seventeen Hundred thirty and two and until the
Twenty first day of June in the year of our Lord God Seven
teen Hundred thirty and three to wit at the Hundred of
