hundred pounds of Tobacco each to be made and conveyed on their
body goods and Chattle Lands and Tenements to the use of his
said Majesty his heirs and assigns With condition that if
the said John pay the whole of the said sum on the first day
of the next of May after the date of this Court then this Recognizance to
be void Else to remain in full paid in Law

His Majesty's Commission directed given the Sheriff of Kent
Peter Cader in the year of our Lord Seventeen hundred
thirty six that he should take Peter Cader late of Shrovelary Parish
in the County of Kent Whose name is found in his Bailiwick and
himself keeps so that he had his body before the Justice of our
said County Court to be held at our Court house in the Town of Chertsey
in said County on the third Tuesday of June next to answer unto
a certain Judgment for committing fornication And that the
said Sheriff had at the time and place of the said Writ
At which said third Tuesday of June being the twenty first day
of said month in the year of our Lord Seventeen hundred thirty &
seven cometh William Harris gentleman Sheriff of Kent County
and makes return thereof to the Court here. Endowed as follows

Kent County J^r W^m Harris remembered that on the third day
of May in the year of our Lord Seventeen hundred thirty three
came before the subscriber one of his Majesty's Justices of
the Peace for the County of Kent Peter Cader, William Smith
& Richard Prid and acknowledged themselves indebted
unto the Right Honourable the Lord Prop^r that is today Peter
Cader in the sum of twenty pounds and William Smith
and
