In the said Richard Bullen all that parcel of land called Harley, lying in Cecil County being  
-ing at a marked oak: near the mouth of the aforesaid River being the land of the said  
feudal law to the East South South west down the Bay for Breadth three hundred and twenty five  
perches to a marked oak: by the Bay side bounding on the South by a Lyne drawn East from the  
oak for Length three hundred and twenty perches. On the East by a Lyne drawn north north

containing six hundred Acres more or less. Together with all Rights Profits and Benefits thereunto  
belonging Royal mines excepted to have and to hold the same unto him the said Richard Bullen his  
heires and Assignes forever To be holden of us and our heires as of our manor of Baltimore  
in free and common Socage: by fealty only for all manner of Services yielding and paying thereto  
yearly unto us and our heires at our Receipt at our City of Saint Marys all the two most feasts  
the feast of Saint Michell the Archangel by ower and equal portions the Rent of our  
pound six shillings Sterling in silver or gold And for a fine upon every Alienation of the  
said land or any part or parcel therof our whole years Term in silver or gold or the  
full value therof in full commodity as wille or our heires or such officer or officers appointed  
by us or our heires to collect and receive the same shall except in discharge thereof all  
the charges of us and our heires or such officer or officers aforesaid Provided that if he the said  
Richard Bullen his heires or Assignes shall not pay unto us and our heires or such officer or  
officers as aforesaid the said fine for such Alienation and unto the said officer  
upon Record either in the provincial Court or in the County Court where the said parcel of  
land lyeth within one month next after such Alienation the said Alienation shall be  
void and of none effect Given at our City of Saint Marys under the great Seal of our  
said Province of Maryland the sixth day of June in the fourth years of our Dominion  
1704 Anno Dom. One thousand six hundred and twenty nine. Witness our self.

This Indenture made the fourth day of May in the fourth years of the Dominion of his Right Honourable Charles  
the first Lord and Proprietor of the Province of Maryland and Charles Lord Baron of Baltimore and in the  
years of our Lord God One thousand six hundred and twenty nine Between Thomas Mearns of Kent County in the  
Province of Maryland and of the one parts, and Thomas Sharling of the City of Calvert in the  
other parts Whereas the Right Honourable William of great nobility late absolute Lord and Proprietory  
of the said Province of Maryland and Charles Lord Baron of Baltimore under the great Seal of the said  
Province of Maryland for granting of lands, their, bearing date at the City of Saint Marys the thirteenth day of  
April in the third and fourth years of the Dominion of the said Right Honourable Charles, over the said Province  
of Maryland and Charles Lord Baron of Baltimore in the years of our Lord God One thousand six hundred and twenty nine  
the said Indenture therein contained, Grant and confirmed unto him the said Thomas Mearns, All that parcel of Land called  
Major's Point lying in the County of Calvert in the most side of the Chesapeake Bay on the East being part of a  
tract of land formerly surveyed by Robert Clarke then Surveyor: called by the name of Major's Point part of  
the granted premises, lying in Calvert County, the beginning at a marked Mulberry tree standing by a little brook  
by the Bay side, and running up the Bay side North, for breadth two hundred and twenty perches and a half to a  
bounded tree standing unto a house called fishing house in the aforesaid land being the southernmost bounded tree  
of a parcel of land formerly surveyed for Anthony Salloway being the part of the said tract bounded on the  
west with a line drawn west from the said tree for Length three hundred twenty five perches, to a  
marked oak standing in the woods, in a swamp bounded on the south with a line drawn South from the  
said tree two hundred and twenty perches and a half to a bounded oak standing in the woods bounded on  
the East with a line drawn east for the Length of three hundred twenty five perches to the first bounded  
Mulberry tree being the bounded tree of a tract of land formerly surveyed for Richard Bonnett Esq: on the  
north with the Bay, containing and laid out for three hundred acres more or less Together with all
