 said Underwood then promised to find a Sloop to meet the said Ship In order to
 to receive from on board such goods as were prohibited, then accordingly
 the D. poult went and having to the best of his Judgment: s. H. & all other articles
 between the said Estio and the said Merchants and between the Freighters and
 principal Merchant Our Mr. Lynch, that then they with the D. poult
 according to the Advice aforesaid Underwood s. H. says for the said aforesaid
 and the said Sloop not meeting us, as expected, this D. p. raised leave of the
 said Estio to find his Goals with the D. poult to s. H. with the Main
 of War red. upon St. George, as also what stays the expected Sloop -
 with being accordingly done the said Cap. Estio then at St. Jerome put a floor
 a parcel of S. wauls, that after the D. poult being red as aforesaid to
 Mr. Underwood's Port he immediately found no likelihood of the Sloop, w. H.
 we understood the D. poult that he was unwilling to consume himself
 therein, but that he the said Underwood went in person with the D. poult
 to meet the said Ship and with her returned to the Port called St. Inago where
 being arrived that at the request of the Merchants and Master the
 D. poult had his men to help land such goods as said Merch. Crand
 that the D. p. saw one of S. Merchants Christopher Mason, employing
 himself in taking an account of the S. wauls so landed, and that another
 went with the boats to see and take account of them in the Cellar, and the
 D. p. in the behalf of the said Merchants Enquired of said Underwood where
 the said goods should be landed, that the said Underwood ordered a parcel
 of Wye's to be landed in his Barre with straw to be layed on them, and
 the Dry goods to be putt into a Plain Cellar, that this D. p. saw several
 parcels of Cask, Balis, Boxes, and Staddles, with some Boulds of Lead or
 of other sorts, look hats &c and that the same night the said Underwood came to
 the D. p. and told him that Mr. Clark then being in the house was resolved to
 inform Major Swall, at w. H. this D. p. being much concerned went immediately to Mr.
 Swall to make the first Information in favor of the said Merchants and Cap.
 Estio, and that the said Swall, not being qualified to receive such Information
 the D. p. did then go on board and informed the said Estio and Merchants, how they
 were betrayed, that then at the request of the said Estio and Merchants the D. p.
 w. H. Our Duty then made of said Ship did prepare to make the first Information -
 w. H. accordingly had been done had not Mr. Underwood persuaded the D. p. that his
 own going would be more to the Ship and Merchants advantage, to w. H. the D. p. at
 last consulted that the next day was, that the Hon. Major Swall, and after him
 the Hon. Col. Danvers, were coming, w. H. accordingly repaired, and the said Underwood
 going with the said Major Swall to s. H. the said Wye, that then the D. poult
 suspecting his failure in the trust imposed in him, did then at the request of the said
 Merchants had them sign a receipt for the goods to Our Mr. James York, which
 in order went to the D. p. with Our Mr. General, the Merchants and some of said D. p. w. H.

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
