 wife doo hereby acknowledge accordingly and themselves to be thereof and thereunto satisfied and
 thereof and of every part thereof doo cheerly acquit honorably and discharge the said John
 Raynoff his heirs Executors and administrators and every of them for ever by these presents **They**
 the said phillip Synor and Margaret his wife have granted bargained sold aliened Enfeoffed and
 confirmed and by these presents doo grant bargain sold aliened and confirms unto the
 said John Raynoff and his heirs All that parcel of Ground land lying nearest together about 7
 foot of St. Marys and formerly called the Gournes field bounding on the West with S. George River
 on the North with S. Marys Bay on the East with the mill Creek to the distance of about forty five feet
 above the mill where the fosse of S. Peters and the Chappell land meet in one angle on the South
 with the said Chappell land by a right line drawn from the said angle Easterly unto S. George River
 containing one hundred Acres or thereabouts be it more or less And likewise all that parcel of forest land
 bounding on the North with Chinsky Bay on the East with a right line drawn from the head of a
 little brook in the said Bay called Nerlan brook unto the head of a branch of broad brook called
 James branch on the South with the said branch and brook and on the West with polemark river
 containing six hundred Acres more or less And likewise one other parcel of land forest land bounding on
 the North with the said broad brook on the East with a right line drawn from the head of James branch
 in the said brook through the woods due South East until it fall upon a brook running into the Spaik Bay
 called the Deep brook and along the said brook to the head thereof and thence over the Wood
 unto the head of a brook running into polemark river called the Oyster brook on the South with the said
 Oyster brook on the West with polemark river containing three hundred Acres be it more or
 less And likewise one other parcel of forest land bounding on the North with the said creek called
 Deep creek and Oyster brook and extending all the space of the North between polemark river on
 the West the Spaik Bay on the East and St. Michaels point on the South containing fifty five hundred Acres
 or thereabouts be it more or less all which said land are lying and being in St. Marys County and were
 granted by patent bearing date the thirteenth day of August 1634 unto Edward Calvert Esq: Treasurer
 and the said three parts divided into Mannors by the said patent the first part to be one Entire
 Mannor and called by the name of Trinity manor, the second and third manor and called by the name
 of St. Gabriels manor and the third to be one Entire manor also and called by the name of St.
 Michaels Mannor with priviledges within every or any of the said Mannors to keep Court and
 Court Baron with all things in the said Court or either of them belonging or by the law or custom of
 England And also all that North of land lying nearest together about Kentford bounding on the
 East West and South with the Spaik Bay on the North with a line drawn through the woods straight
 East beginning at the North Easterly point of the brook called North West brook ending in a
 Swamp on the East side of the said North West Spaik Bay containing and layd out in the whole
 for one hundred Acres more or less and lying upon the hills of Kent and called by the name of Kent
 ford Mannor And all that North of land called Doggs north situated lying and being in Charles County
 on the South side of plantation river beginning at a marked history standing by a Marsh upon
 the river side and running West downe the river the length of three hundred paces thence
 South downe the river the length of three hundred paces to the mouth of a brook called
 Chingamung brook bounding on the North with the said brook running East six hundred paces
 on the East with a line drawn North North West from the end of the East line to the first
 marked history on the West by the said river containing and then layd out for four hundred and
 fifty Acres more or less And also another parcel of land lying upon the said river to the East
 of the said North by the said brook beginning at a cedar standing in an Indian field running southerly
 the said brook for the breadth of one hundred paces to a marked oak by a Marsh side bounding

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
