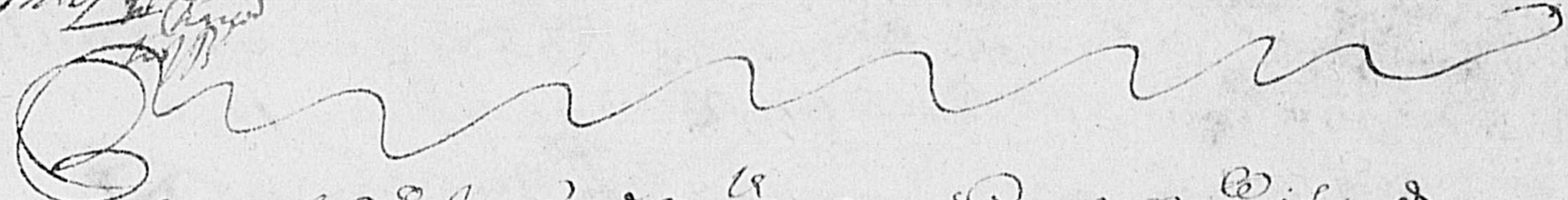

This Indenture made y^e 10th Day of Aug^r in the ninth Year of the
Reign of our Sovereign Lord King of Great Britain, &c. Anno 1710
Between Philimon Lloyd Esq^r & Margaret his wife of y^e one part and
William Bladen Gent^l of y^e other part Witnesses, that the said Philimon
Lloyd and Margaret his wife for and in Consideration of y^e Summe of fifty
pounds Sterling to them in hand paid and have and doo hereby Grant Bargain Lett
alon ourse offe robes and Cupbords to the said William Bladen two Lots of Land
with the house or houses thereupon erected situate being in the City of Annapolis
that is to say One Lott next to the said Mr. Lloyd's Garden and whereof Daniel
Brignall Shoemaker now hostell Keeping so unlicensd was formerly by
the said Bladen sold to Major John Freeman & his heirs) & one other
Lott next to John Westers commonly called and known by the name of
the Hunting Lott with all their Right title and Interest therunto
to have and to hold the same to him the said William Bladen his
heirs & assigns for ever to the said proper use and behoofe of y^e said
William Bladen his heirs & assigns for ever - In witness whereof the parties
to these presents have interchangably set their hands &
