have received from Spain; are extremely good. On
the 27th and 28th of July there was a famous bat-
tle fought between the Spanish combined army
and the French at Salavero, in which they were
completely routed, with the loss of ten thousand
men, left in the field of battle. Our loss was not
much but the English suffered great deal. They
lost war of three thousand men and three generals.
I believe that Bonaparte will see clearly that
it is very different to fight an army or to fight a
Nation which fights for its liberty, and every
sacred thing in the world. I hope for the good and
tranquility of Europe, as well as that of the whole
world, that the Emperor of Austria and others, will
find that great man, and that never to his
own territory, and that the balance of Europe may
be restored again.

Enough of politics, I repeat again my ardent
wishes for the welfare of your country, and
that you may preserve your liberty and neutrality
which cost so much blood to your fathers.
You will have the goodness to present my most humble
respects to Mr. W. C. Cullen, at the same time
my compliments to your son, and beg you to con-
sider me, your most obedient and humble servant
