

literary college, shall be accepted by the State Board of Osteopathic Examiners as an equivalent for the first year in a recognized reputable osteopathic college. Provided, that the examinations of the first year of the said osteopathic college have been successfully passed, and accepted by the osteopathic college as dealing adequately with chemistry, toxicology, physics, physiology, anatomy and the biologic sciences. Such proof shall be made, if required, on affidavit.]

(b) Upon [the making of said] payment OF THE APPLICATION FEE and SUBMISSION OF THE REQUIRED proof, the State Board of Osteopathic Examiners, if satisfied with the same, shall admit THE applicant to examination as to his qualifications for the practice of osteopathy [; which]. THE examination shall include the subjects of anatomy, physiology, AND hygiene, AND OTHER HEALTH AND MEDICAL SUBJECTS RELATED TO THE principles and practice of osteopathy. On receiving from the committee of examiners, delegated to conduct examinations as provided for in § 471 of this article, official report of the examination of any applicant for license, the [said State] Board [of Osteopathic Examiners] IMMEDIATELY shall issue [, forthwith,] to each applicant who shall have obtained a general average of not less than seventy-five per centum, and therefore has been returned as having successfully passed said examination, and who shall have been adjudged by the [said] Board [of Examiners] to be [duly] qualified for the practice of osteopathy, a license to practice osteopathy in the State of Maryland, as provided for in § 476 of this article. In case of failure at any such examinations the candidate, after the expiration of six months, and within two years, shall have the privilege of a second examination. Having failed upon a second examination, as herein provided, application de nova may be made, upon conforming with the standard of qualification both as to character, preliminary and osteopathic education, in force at the time of [said] application, and upon the payment of a \$45 \$25 fee [of twenty-five dollars].

(a) [A school or college of osteopathy to be recognized as reputable under the provisions of this subtitle must be legally incorporated, prosecute a course of study consisting of the element as provided for under the provisions of this subtitle, and requiring attendance and instruction in all the branches of study in which examinations are required for licensure under the provisions of this subtitle. Provided, that nothing in this subtitle shall be construed to affect the right to practice osteopathy on the part of any person who was in the practice of osteopathy within this State on April 13, 1914. Such a person appearing before the clerk of the county in which he or she is practicing, or clerk of the Circuit Court of Baltimore City, and making affidavit to that effect, and upon presenting to the clerk a license issued by the State Board of Osteopathic Examiners and
