The Commission shall report its recommendations to the Governor and the General Assembly within one year. The commission shall be composed of one member of the Maryland Senate, one member of the Maryland House of Delegates, a representative the Executive Department, the Executive Director of the Maryland Health Services Cost Review Commission, Maryland State Insurance Commissioner, a representative of the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, the Maryland Medical-Chirurgical Scciety, the Maryland State Chamber of Commerce, the AFL-CIC, the Maryland Hospital Association, the Blue Cross of Maryland, Inc., the Blue Shield of Maryland, Inc., the Maryland Insurance Association, the Professional Standards Review Organization of Maryland, the Executive Director of the Comprehensive Health Planning Agency, the Maryland Foundation for Health Care, the Health Facilities of Maryland, Independent Practitioners Associates, Maryland Society of Pathologists, Maryland Radiology Society, Maryland Society of Cardiologists, the Medical Service of the District of Columbia, and Financial Officer from an Investor-owned Hospital; and be it further
