5<sup>th</sup> I give and bequeath unto my son John yearly my RUM Case and Bottles.


6<sup>th</sup> I give & bequeath unto my Daughter Mary Butters my Looking Glass.

7<sup>th</sup> I give & bequeath unto my wife Elizabeth yearly all the residue of my Estate both Real and personal during her Widowhood.

Signed Sealed and Acknowledged by the within named John yearly this to be his last Will and Testament this 7<sup>th</sup> day of May 1783.
