



but and if my Daughter Susannah should die before my wife Rebecca

 arrives at the age of twenty ~~one~~ years (if not married before) And then
 the whole of her Estate to fall into her own Hands and be at her own
 Disposal either at the day of her Marriage, or at Twenty ~~one~~ years
 of age, she may lawfully call upon my wife Rebecca for her portion,
 and she my wife Rebecca is to be accountable to my Daughter for all
 that I have now left, Notwithstanding any thing in this present
 Writing contained to the contrary. This I declare and pronounce to
 be my last Will and Testament disallowing and revoking all every
 other Will or Testament or Wills or Testaments heretofore made by
 me, or for me, and do approve this and no other In Testimony whereof
 I have hereunto set my Hand and Seal this seventh day of January Anno
 Domini Seventeen hundred and Eighty four
 Signed Sealed pronounced and
 declared in the presence of . . .  his mark
 William Mason
 February 25th 1784 then came John Lowman Hyuson Smyth & William Pyronan
 the three subscribing Witnesses to the within last Will Testament of William
 Mason late of Kent County dead and severally made oath on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty
 God that they did see the Testator therein named sign and Seal this Will, and
 that they heard him publish pronounce and declare the same to be his
 last Will and Testament, that at the time of his so doing, he was to the best
 of their apprehensions of sound and disposing mind, memory, and
 understanding; and that they respectively subscribed their names as Witnesses
 to this Will in the presence, and at the Request of the Testator and in the presence
 of each other.
