A Senate Joint Resolution concerning

Governor's Commission on Welfare Grants

FOR the purpose of requesting the Governor to recognize the findings of the Governor's Commission on Welfare Grants as a realistic statement of the funds needed by individuals and families for a minimally decent life; and requesting the Governor to use the findings as a basis for determining the budget for the various public assistance programs.
