In accordance with Article II, Section 17 of the Maryland Constitution, I have today vetoed House Bill 1254.

This bill authorizes the creation of a State debt. The proceeds of this loan are to be used for the renovation and equipment of laboratory and teaching space in Dunning and Remsen Halls on The Johns Hopkins University Homewood Campus.

Senate Bill 924, which was passed by the General Assembly and signed by me on June 1, 1982, accomplishes the same purpose. Therefore it is not necessary for me to sign House Bill 1254.
