- (I) TO GRANT TO THE AUTHORITY POWERS IN ANY SUBSTANTIVE AREA NOT OTHERWISE GRANTED TO THE AUTHORITY BY OTHER PUBLIC GENERAL OR PUBLIC LOCAL LAW;
- (II) TO RESTRICT THE AUTHORITY FROM EXERCISING ANY POWER GRANTED TO THE AUTHORITY BY OTHER PUBLIC GENERAL OR PUBLIC LOCAL LAW OR OTHERWISE; NOR
- (III) TO AUTHORIZE THE AUTHORITY OR ITS OFFICERS TO ENGAGE IN ANY ACTIVITY WHICH IS BEYOND THEIR POWER UNDER OTHER PUBLIC GENERAL LAW, PUBLIC LOCAL LAW, OR OTHERWISE---; OR
- AUTHORITY OF ANY STATE DEPARTMENT OR AGENCY UNDER ANY PUBLIC GENERAL LAW.
- [(d)] (E) For purposes of this section, the phrase "housing or housing project for persons of eligible income" means any undertaking or project, or portion thereof, including lands, buildings and improvements, real, mixed and personal properties or interest therein that is planned, acquired, owned, developed, constructed, reconstructed, rehabilitated or improved for purposes of providing dwelling accommodations, a substantial portion of which accommodations shall be for persons of eligible income, and such streets, roads, sewer and waterlines and other supporting public and private facilities intended for commercial, educational, cultural, recreational, community or other civic purposes as may be deemed necessary for sound community development.
- [(e)] (F) For purposes of this section, the phrase "persons of eligible income" means persons who individually or as part of a family unit lack sufficient income or assets (as determined by the mayor of Baltimore City or his designee) to enable them, without financial assistance, to live in decent, safe and sanitary dwellings without overcrowding.

8C.

(a) It is found and declared that there exists within Prince George's County (1) a shortage of decent, safe, and adequate housing, and (2) a number of economically depressed areas and housing in need of rehabilitation. As a result, county residents are forced to occupy overcrowded, congested and deteriorated housing and live in depressed neighborhoods. These conditions necessitate excessive and disproportionate expenditures of public funds for public health, safety and welfare protection, and other public services and facilities. The shortage of decent, safe, and adequate housing and the revitalization of depressed neighborhoods and rehabilitation of housing cannot be relieved wholly through the operation of private enterprise. The construction and rehabilitation of housing for Prince George's County residents, and the acquisition and expenditure of public funds to produce such housing,
