Dear Mr. President:

In accordance with Article II, Section 17 of the Maryland Constitution, I have today vetoed Senate Bill 466.

This bill prohibits denying admittance to or interfering with the enjoyment of certain public facilities by any blind or visually impaired, or deaf or hearing impaired persons. Failure to comply constitutes a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, is subject to a fine not to exceed \$500 for each offense.

House Bill 1211, which was passed by the General Assembly and signed by me on May 31, 1983, accomplishes the same purpose. Therefore it is not necessary for me to sign Senate Bill 466.
