Dear Mr. President:

In accordance with Article II, Section 17 of the Maryland Constitution, I have today vetoed Senate Bill 781.

This bill and House Bill 1462 amend the definition of crime in the Criminal Injuries Compensation Act to exclude an act involving the operation of a watercraft which Senate Bill 781 defines as a "boat" and House Bill 1462 defines as a "vessel." Although the terms "boat" and "vessel" are nearly synonymous and although the enactment of one bill instead of the other might have no substantive effect, the term "vessel" is clearly defined in the Natural Resources Article and, therefore, its use tends to delimit the types of acts involving watercraft which the amendment to the Criminal Injuries Compensation Act intended to exclude.

For these reasons, I have decided to veto Senate Bill 781.
