 of himself & one boy & maid & his wife & further sheweth that the said John  
 Avery desired this def. Avery's wife to returne with him for Maryland and that  
 he this def. should not only leave herself but all that he had when he departed  
 And thereupon the said John Avery gave this def. Avery's wife money to buy what  
 she had occasion for but how much this def. Avery saith that he knoweth And that  
 the said John Avery saith promised this def. Avery that her wife should not  
 want nothing that he had And that the said def. Avery on those parts for many  
 & repeated as aforesaid agreed with Geo. Walter & Dunde for the passage of  
 himself & wife & one more man for. And the said John Avery for himself  
 & one woman for. And that the said ship being bound at Graves End  
 by an Embargo the said John Avery bearing of a writ taken out ag. him  
 out of the High Court of Admiralty made address of gift to the said def. Avery of all his  
 goods on board the said ship & delivered one powder dish in the hammock  
 the whole withal & more And that the said John Avery came on board  
 the said ship at the Downs And the said John Avery at sea doth make  
 of the said def. Avery the said def. Avery of gift which he refused to deliver And the  
 def. Avery further sheweth that being sick he the said John Avery open the said  
 def. Avery's chest in the night & took out all his writings And that after wards  
 arriving in this province all the goods were landed at the said doings house  
 and that the said def. Avery delivered to the said Avery whatsoever he claimed  
 to be his And demitteth that the said John Avery for the passage of the said def. Avery  
 & himself for England And further sheweth that the said John Avery  
 and the said def. Avery's passages were paid for England out of the money  
 recovered as aforesaid And confesseth that his wife had for all times  
 money out of the money recovered in England but demitteth that  
 that he knoweth what summe And the said def. Avery demitteth that he ever  
 saith of the said Avery the value of twenty shillings more than what  
 he saithly repaid him And that the said John Avery did never  
 entrust him with all the goods mentioned in the said schedule but what  
 the said Avery claimed as his due he delivered to him And the said  
 def. Avery saithly demitteth that he ever was a suitor to the said Avery to go with  
 him for England or to be bound in any estate to be fallen out him but  
 that he went with him the said John Avery upon the grounds & motives  
 before mentioned & no other Demitteth that the said John Avery lent him  
 one pound ster. to sett in his cockpit And the said def. Avery saithly demitteth  
 that the said John Avery took no wages for him & his wife or paid for his passage  
 or that ever the said Avery did entrust him with the keeping of any summe  
 summe of money whatsoever or that the said Avery lent him money to buy  
 cloth
