answers being openly read and heard, this Court was fully satisfied that it was the
intention of Joseph Moorly deceased by sale of his lands in his bill intended
to pay his debts, and to that end and purpose did give the same to his Ex^r -
Robert Proctor and John Gator, did their fore think fit, and it is this present
day to wit on Thursday the sixteenth of October in the fourth year of the Dominion
of Charles the first the Hon^{ble} Philip Calvert Chancellor, William Calvert Secretary, Virtue
Lowe and William Stouens and by their power and authority of the high Court of Chancery
Ordered adjudged and Decreed that the said Robert Proctor and John Gator shall and
doe should and enjoy the said severall parcels of land called Moorly Ground and Moorly
Lott with their appurtenances, (Except the said one hundred acres sold to Roper) to
them and their heirs for ever against all manner of persons whatsoever and
that they do in consideration thereof the whole or by some other means or way or pay and
satisfie the said Comptts and all other the Credits of the said Joseph Moorly his Just
and due debts according to the will of the said Joseph Moorly aforesaid, and that they
may sell and dispose thereof at their will and pleasure and for their use during they are
protected and empowered by this special Decree.

At a Court of Chancery holden at the City of Saint Marys the sixteenth day of Oct^r
anno Domini One thousand six hundred seventy nine, in a cause there depending
between John Larkin, Nathaniel Heathcote, Murrine Deuell, John Bramwell,
Gabriel Barret, Leonard Peck and Martha his wife adm^r of the goods and Chattels
of William Russell deceased all of Chancery County a well for themselves as
others the Creditors of Joseph Moorly of the same County deceased Comptts against
Robert Proctor and John Gator Ex^r of the last Will and Testament of the said
Joseph Moorly Deceased.

Chancery County, on a branch of Potomack River beginning at a bound
post standing by the said branch side, and running north one hundred and five perches
to a red oak marked with four notches bounded on the north by a line drawn
north-north-east forty five perches to a marked post, then north forty five perches
