under the great seals of this Province, both bearing date the tenth day of July in the
years of our Lord one thousand six hundred seventy one of his Majesty of Chas-
Arundell, under the yearly Rent of fifteen shillings and five pence sterling, and
of which last mentioned Charter for four hundred and fifty acres, the said Joseph
Moorly by his assignment under his hand and seals and Indorsed on the back of
the said Charter bearing date the second day of November Anno Domini one thousand
six hundred seventy two, did grant bargain sell and confirm unto William Roper
Shoemaker, one hundred acres of land out of the said land called Moorly's
Lot which hundred acres of land beginneth at a bounded white oak, and running
south by Morris's Land sixty perches to a bounded oak in Dorset's Land,
then west and by north three hundred and eighty perches to a marked oak, then north
north - east sixty perches to another marked oak, then East and by south to the first bounded
oak, to have and to hold, the said one hundred acres unto him the said William Roper
his heirs and assigns for ever, and the said Joseph Moorly being so seized and
possessed and being indebted to your Orator and several other persons in Consideration
of Summes of Tobacco, that is to say to your Orator: John Lurham by bill one
thousand pounds of Tobacco and by order of four six hundred pounds of Tobacco,
to your Orator: Nathaniel Southcott by bill and account six hundred and one
pounds of Tobacco, to your Orator: Marriage Dowry by account four hundred
pounds of Tobacco, to your Orator: John Greenmount as adm^r of Christur Bristow
two thousand pounds of Tobacco, to your Orator: Gabriel Parrot by order of Lord
one hundred and fifty pounds of Tobacco, to your Orator: Leonard Coates and his wife
