

George Furwen make oath that upon the Thirtieth day of April 1682 he went to the dwelling house of Mr. Hoarman the high sherriff of Marisco County where Joseph Eilly was a prisoner and by vertue of a Letter of Attorney under the hand and seal of George Parker bearing date the Eight day of April 1682 did demand of the said Joseph Eilly to pay the sum of Twenty thousand pounds of Tobacco due to be paid by the said Eilly to the said Parker by vertue of a Certificate Dened out of the hono^{ble} Court of Chancery served upon him by James Cranford in the month of September 1680 and the said Joseph Eilly then said that Mr. Parker had treated him the said Eilly sufficiently already and that he the said Parker shall take no advantage of the said Eillys words now for he the said Eilly shall not say any thing at all to it till sure time as he should have countell assigned him to speak for him and then words shall talk with him the said Parker did that the said Furwen at the said day and time aforesaid did likewise demand of the said Joseph Eilly if he would pay the sum of Twelve thousand six hundred fifty & two pounds of Tobacco for cost of suite allowed by the said Parker by the said Certificate and the said Eilly then said that he must know whether this be his time limited for the payment of it before he should say any thing to it and that he the said Furwen upon the said day and time aforesaid after he had demanded the said sum of Twenty thousand pounds of Tobacco of the said Eilly and had received the answer of him the said Eilly in manner aforesaid he did tender unto the said Eilly a Letter of Attorney bearing date the Eight day of April 1682 and demanded of him the said Eilly to signe & seal the said Letter of Attorney to him the said Furwen to give possession and seizin of all sure, messuages, tenements or dwelling houses or orchards, parks, gardens, lands, premises, his wife, he, his children and servants to the said Parker for want of payment of the said sum of Twelve thousand six hundred fifty & two pounds of Tobacco and the said Eilly altogether refused to signe, seal or to look upon the said Letter of Attorney or to have any thing to do with it.
