366 Deponment for Coll Lloyd for yr Land Nathaniel Point filed 7. 5. 1704

The Masters of Henry Coffin aged fifty years or thereabouts is for the said Deponment
asked him by Coll Lloyd of Talbot City of the concerning yr sale of a certain tract
of Land call'd 50. called Nathaniel Point lying in the River in the County
of Talbot City of the said Henry Coffin having first taken his Oath before Mr Will Cury
Commissioner of the said County of Talbot City on the 19th day of Oct 1702 at which time
of Chancery bearing date the 19th day of Oct 1702 at which time Nathaniel Point
of the said County of Talbot City did give notice to Emanuel Cleave to have been present
but for some time past he hath absented himself out of this province
Q. Do you know the said Henry Coffin of Talbot City & Nathaniel Cleave of the
said County likewise?

A. Yes I know them both very well

Q. Do you know a certain tract of Land called Nathaniel Point in the River of

A. Yes I do know 50 of Land so called in the River
Q. Did you know anything relating to the sale of the said Land called Nathaniel
Point from the said Nathaniel Cleave to the said Henry Coffin or of the said Henry Coffin
lodging or sale thereof or of any satisfaction made by the said Cleave of the said Henry Coffin
for the said

A. Near or about forty years past I being in company with the said Nathaniel
Cleave the said Henry Coffin and some other persons at the
house of Mr Ric Woolman in the River of the said Henry Coffin gave at
that time to the said Nathaniel Cleave a Case of Spices for the consideration of the said
Nathaniel Cleave of his title to the said Land to him the said Henry Coffin and
being all present they agreed to divide it out & accordingly at a certain
time called the said Batchelors time passing by the then Road between the
said Woolman and the said Henry Coffin's plantation it was set down &
without drank out of the whole Case of Spices. And the said Nathaniel Cleave did
then & there deposit himself fully satisfied & contented for the said Land from
the said Henry Coffin

Q. To whom said of time was the said Land called Nathaniel Point
deemed & reputed to belong & who hath held the possession of it since?

A. It was always deemed & reputed to be Mr Henry Coffin's
Land during his life & since his death to belong to Coll Phil Lloyd
And altho' I have been very conversant with the said Nathaniel
Cleave since the time I never heard him pretend any claim to
the said Land or ever mention it
