 ther Evidence (viz) Hugh Sherwood, Edw^d Hambleton, Wm Hambleton Edw-
 Elliot Senr and Wm Lewis were by us sworn and Examined W^{ch} Depositions
 are herewith returned; And further as a Description of J^r Natural and
 Artificial Bounds of J^r D^r Land we Certifie, That y^e point and Cove
 mentioned in y^e Several Depositions to be y^e place where the first bound-
 ed Tree of Wades point did stand and upon which there now stands a
 Low Spreading White Oak wth a Leaf Like a Chestnut Tree, which Tree
 the several Evidences we declare upon their Oaths is the Tree that was
 bound to be bounded by Capt James Murphy and Mr Hugh Sherwood
 when they Examined y^e former Evidence (the Notches of y^e D^r Tree
 being almost grown out we have again bounded it and is y^e Cove
 at y^e head of w^{ch} Eunon Williams his Dwelling plantation is now si-
 tuated in a point made by y^e Division of y^e D^r Cove into two Branches
 the y^e Mouth of y^e Cove on which point J^r Hollinsworth men-
 tioned in y^e Depositions did live; which Land of Hollinsworth is call-
 ed Ray Banks and is now in y^e possession of Eunon Williams, and as
 to y^e second bounded Tree of y^e D^r Land called Wades point, we Certifie
 that y^e Course Express in y^e Patent to run from y^e first bounded Tree
 to y^e second is West-North-West and y^e Distance did hundred and twen-
 ty paces, but having run y^e Course as well as we could wth a Small
 Compass and Measured y^e Distance, we find that y^e Course from y^e first
 Tree to y^e second is considerably more Westwardly and y^e Distance two
 hundred thirty and some odd paces but cannot tell exactly for want of
 better Instruments. We had a fair platth Survey produced to us and made
 by Solomon Wright, he was Surveyor of this County by which the Course
 appears to be North 75 Degrees West, and Distance between y^e two bound-
 ed Trees two hundred thirty and six paces w^{ch} we believe to be right, in
 running y^e Land from y^e first bounded Tree to y^e second we came to the
 end of ninety paces to the y^e Mouth of a Cove, being the Cove at
 y^e head of which stands y^e old house and Orchard where Capt Wm
 Lewis in his Life-time dwelt. The D^r Cove divides all y^e Land into two Branches
 as y^e former Cove did, and on y^e Western Side thereof now stands Edw^d
 Lewis his Dwelling house, having crossed y^e Mouth of y^e D^r Cove we
 run through a small point of Marsh which makes y^e Western
 y^e Mouth of it and about four paces from y^e Marsh y^e 120 paces
 mentioned in y^e Patent ends. From thence we run through Edw^d Lewis
 pasture to the head of a small Morisy Gully w^{ch} makes out of y^e Bay
 and from thence to y^e Mouth of another ~~Morisy~~ Gully at a little Dis-
 tance from y^e former, at y^e Mouth of which last Gully the y^e second
