

Now me the other bounded trees of Stotts Lott; Upon which he further showed me a stump of an Oak which he declared was the second bound tree of the land called Stotts Lott and that he saw Charles Boteler bound the same at the first surveying thereof. I further examined the Deponent, if he knew the remaining trees of the said Land: He answered that he knew nothing more further thereof for that at the first survey no more trees was bounded.

At the same time I caused the first tree above mentioned to be kept above the bounding Notches thereof and with a pair of marking Irons cut these Letters in this order S C in the presence of Christopher Simpson: John Lasley: James Moore Jun and John Brown Junior: and also round the second stump I caused sundry Lapsins to be kept in presence of the same persons

August 16: 1708

James Moore aged sixty two years being sworn upon the holy Evangelist that he discover to the best of his knowledge and remembrance the bounds and bounded trees of a tract of Land called by the name of Stotts Lott and formerly surveyed for one Dennis Cunningham and being Examined: declared that within the space of twelve months after the first surveying of the Land called Stotts Lott the Surveyor thereof named Charles Boteler showed him the same bounded oak first mentioned in Col. Nimian Beales Deposition: and told him that it was the Northeast bounded tree of a tract of Land of the Deponents called Moores plained: and also the first bound tree of the Land called Stotts Lott: and further the Deponent saith that some time after Charles Boteler and his Brother Nimian Beales went both with him to the same tree and told him as Charles Boteler had done
