I was employd before she was begun to load: And the others did assist in loading but when tried I know not

We had raff weather being something of a gulf in which we split our fore-sayle broke the rudder and was forc'd into Buggys Creek having a great deale of water in her — where all left her and came to Wye Towne

WC was forc'd to pump out in about two hours when loaded and going to Kent: But in coming back to the best of my knowledge we did not pump for we came over in little time

Richard Austin upon his oath answered: I doe know both Compt^l & Dfnd^r

I heard Mr. Forbes sent some men to carry her to Chichester and he would pay them but they refused.

I believe not for the five-morn boat rotted at Wye Towne

I believe she was Capable of being carried to Wye Towne

The tide falling she was aground some time at Mr. Forbes' landing but I believe she did no damage

Edward Russell seemed to understand sayling but the rest of them knew nothing of the matter

The Sayle would hold hoisting and carried her to Kent, but in coming back in a small storme the fore-sayle split so bad WC assisted in loading; but when tried I found her being a

Perilous
