

Robert Coverthought's Depositions about his Land case Burkett. -

Richard Marsham Aged Seventy seven years or thereabouts deposeth and saith that about forty years agoe y^e Southernost bounds of Marshland formerly of Land of John Read but now the Land of Robert Coverthought was Reputed to be a markt Oak^t that did then stand a little to the Southward of a small Valley that leads into a Marsh which Marsh with the Banks of Sand on each side of it makes a point commonly called or known by the name of Coverthoughts point & further the said Depo^t deposeth and saith that afterwards of forty years agoe there stood a markt Oak^t tree on the North side of the first pond next adjoyning to the North side of Robert Coverthoughts orchard on a point near the River Rye which was Reputed then to be the bounded tree of a piece of Land called Burkett next adjoyning to the Land of Ascome & further y^e Depo^t deposeth and saith that about forty years agoe they^e said Depo^t being in company with Mr Thomas Fruenman then Survey^r of Calvert County and Robert Coverthought son^t of said Thomas Fruenman did Run an east course from Burkett bounded tree standing by the pond aforesaid to a bounded white Oak^t which was Reputed to be y^e North East bounded tree of the aforesaid Land called Burkett and further y^e Depo^t now saith that about one hundred yards to y^e Eastward of the Road that goes from Hutchins's Mill to Bozards Island and about fifty yards to the Westward of a piece of Sunken ground there now stands a white Oak^t tree the said Depo^t doth really suppose to be the bounded white Oak^t aforesaid and further saith not. -

May the 19th 1710, Sworne before me Robert Skinner.

John Rigger aged fifty two years or thereabouts deposeth and saith that in y^e year of our Lord 1671 he the said Depo^t did board or dwelt at the house of one John Edeson in Calvert County which said Edeson was then married to the Relict or Widewoo^r of Rob^t Coverthought son^t of Calvert County and further the said Depo^t saith that the said Edeson did then know y^e said Depo^t a bounde Oak^t that stood on a bank^t neare puting out River side about ten or fifteen paces to the Southward of a small Valley that leads into a Marsh which Marsh with banks of Sand on each side of it makes a point commonly called or known by the name of Coverthoughts point and the said Depo^t deposeth & saith that the said Edeson did tell him y^e said Depo^t that the aforesaid Oak^t was y^e Southward most bounds of the land where he then dwelt which had been the land formerly of one Read and at that time belonged to one Robert Coverthought Jr^t and the Depo^t further saith that he hath often times seen the said Oak^t tree it standing but a little
