John Kemp aged about thirty years concerning the bounds of a Tract of Land called Miles End saith that about fifteen or sixteen years agoe he did see the stump of a pine Tree with one or two notches in it lying upon the sand by the water side about thirty or forty yards below his the said ^{John} Kemp's Landing on the Bay side and that his father did tell him that he did believe it was the second bounded Tree of a Tract of Land called Miles End and further saith that this stump at that time was loose and not any ways fixt in the ground and further saith not

Robert Sands of Talbot County planter aged about fifty years concerning the bounds of a Tract of Land called Miles End, saith that when he was a servant to J^r Cooper being about twenty nine or thirty years agoe he did see a pine Tree lying under the banks on the Bay side about thirty or forty yards below John Kemp's Landing with three notches on the upper side of it but whether there were any more notches on it or not he cannot tell, and that afterwards he this deponer heard Edmund Webb at severall times say that the afo^r pine Tree was the second bounded Tree of a Tract of Land called Miles End, and further saith that he hath heard William Webb in his life time say, that a bounded cedar Tree which stood by a marsh side between the dwelling plantations of the afo^r William Webb and Francis Bullock; and now by there near unto which there was this day a white Banks Tree bounded division Tree between his Land and that which did belong to Ralph Fishburne called Wobloy further saith not
