

John Keonam aged Sixty six years, On his oath says that about Thirly four years agoe Henry Parker who was Surveyor told him that the Free Tree was nowal (where Thomas Edmonson Beguins for Mount hope) was the Counter Tree of my Lords Mannor, and further that the said Parker said he bounded it with his owne hands, with a Hatchett, and that my Lords Mannor Runn Rghundred perchs one every and Sighundred another South and North, And further saith,

Thomas Smithson aged about Sixty years upon his oath saith, That in the Lifetime of William Parrott, (which he thinks was about Twenty five years agoe,) he the said Deponent made it his Care and Busines, Diligently to Ingrike after the Boundes of Mount hope, and hearing that the said William Parrott or Andrew Skinner Esq; who had been the Ancient Surveyor knew the bounded Tree of the said Land, he the said Deponent went to William Parrott who was then sick, and the said William Parrott being asked if he knew the bounded Tree of the said Land, called Mount hope, he Answered he did very well and he thought no body else living knew it, The said Deponent further saith, that he made this Reply to the said William Parrott that Mr John Edmonson had told him this Deponent, that the bounded Tree of my Lords Mannor was the first tree of Mount hope, which the said William Parrott seemed to ridicule and Answered him this Deponent thus, saith Edmonson will say any thing for his owne advantage, but he very well knowes that it is not the Tree, —

The Deponent further saith, that at his earnest Desire to know where the tree stood, the said William said a great way off, and that if ever he was able to goo abroad he would shew it him, And this Deponent saith, that afterward he applied himself to the said Mr Andrew Skinner, and demanded of him the said thing (vizt) where the bounded Tree of Mount hope stood, telling the said Skinner further, that the said John Edmonson pretended to take the Counter Tree of my Lords Mannor for the bounded Tree of the said Mount hope, who Answered him the said Deponent, that, that was not the bounded Tree of Mount hope, but if he the said Dep^t would goo from that Tree of the Mannor South about a certain Number of perchs, which aske this Deponent thinks made about half a mile, and then west, it would carry him to a bounded Tree which the said Skinner said he alwayes took to be the bounded Tree of Mount hope. And further this Depon^t saith not —
