Thomas Trueman Greenfilds Deposition about Trent nock taken by Virtue of a Commission out of Chancery Directed to Jos^{ph} Low Cap^t Justice & M^r Chesb^olyn Dated 11th Mar^{ch} 1712

Maryland^s The Deposition of Richard Marsh of Prince Georges County Aged Seventy and nine Years maketh oath that to the best of his Remembrance M^r Thomas Trueman did did shew this Depouent a bound Free belonging to the Land he formerly lived on (called Trent nock) Standing near and facing the River of Potomack and the back Creeks near M^r Charles Ashcomer and this Depouent further says that the aforesaid M^r Thomas Trueman deceased who well remembred did inform this Depou. that a certain plantation whereon one Cornelius Canaday was then seated was within the bounds of the Said Trueman's Land and that the Said Canaday did leave the Said plantation for that reason and that this Depou. was afterwards Employed as a Carpenter to build some houses for the Said Canaday upon the Manour near Bonndiel Leonard Towne.
